Upcoming Changes: Insurance Plan Options for International Students

- ► A "Plan B" option
- Goal is to benefit schools with smaller international enrollments but may be an option for all
- Eligibility:
 - ► F-1 / J-1 non-resident alien international students / scholars NOT funded through assistantships by the institutions
 - Students on OPT / AT
- These students may waive out of the mandatory plan, and opt for the new plan specific to internationals (see hand-out)
- \$68. per month; medevac and re-patriation coverage available under a rider at \$100. per year
- Big jump in cost if spouse is added though --

Insurance – continued

- ► There may be a direct bill option for institutions
- Company is working on a dedicated link for internationals to use to sign up
- Insurance is valid only while full-time enrollment is maintained
- ▶ Not yet in effect but possibly very soon...
- ▶ Upcoming meeting in Atlanta on July 31st with Dr. Podoll and insurance review committee to discuss further
- ► Even if available option for fall, further changes may be required by January, when new provisions from the ACA may be implemented

Travel Insurance - Reminder

- USG covers all employees, their spouses and dependents, under a worldwide travel policy
- See handout
- Covers business and personal travel, domestically and internationally
- Gap in coverage, though, when it comes to liability insurance

Out-of-State Tuition Waivers

- Memo went out earlier in June to Presidents regarding imminent changes to waiver numbers allotted to each school
- Proposed cut back form 4% of enrollment to 3% for larger schools
- Cut back to 1.5% for smaller schools
- Proposal to clump three types of waivers (international students, athletes and outstanding academic students) into one category
 - ▶ Limit each group to no more that 1/3 of the total numbers awarded
 - Students must be in top quartile
 - Maintain a 3.0 GPA
- At Tech for instance, and smaller schools the majority of waivers go to athletes...this would have a big impact on those schools.

Waivers (continued)


- Institutional president responses were received and are being taken into consideration
- Waivers are on the agenda for the August BoR meeting
- These changes would be effective Fall 2015.
- Current students would be grandfathered in through graduation

Tuition Waivers and International Exchange Students

- Reminder from Dr. Podoll:
 - ▶ A full waiver of all tuition is possible, but only if it is a true one-to-one exchange
 - Exchanges under a full waiver should be timely (say within a year) but do not need to be concurrent
 - ▶ This is not possible for Fulbright or Rotary exchange students

USG students who participate in approved study abroad programs should normally be assessed tuition and program fees by their home institution (or the sponsoring institution) Bursar's Office. Study Abroad Offices and program directors should avoid the direct receipt of payments from students, whenever possible. Permitted exceptions include the payment of an initial application fee. Study Abroad Offices and program directors should provide to the Bursar's Office necessary information about each student and his/her appropriate program charges, so that these can be entered into the institution's student information system.

In most instances, a USG student should remain registered at his/her home institution during the period of international study. Students remain eligible for all appropriate financial aid. Financial aid awards may be adjusted to include the higher costs of travel, living expenses, etc. that may be incurred for the study abroad program.

Study abroad fees generally consist of two components:

- 1. Tuition and mandatory student fees related to the actual registration for classes. All study abroad students pay a minimum of in-state tuition and applicable mandatory fees, some of which may be waived in accordance with BOR policy. Whenever possible, tuition should be assessed by the regular student information system when registration occurs. Payment due dates and refund dates should be the same as those for students taking campus-based courses.
 - Tuition charges for out-of-state students are set at a minimum of in-state tuition plus a \$250 surcharge per term. A higher surcharge may be assessed if approved by the president of the institution or her/his designee, but the tuition and surcharge should never exceed the BOR approved limit for out-of-state tuition charges.
- 2. Program specific fees (for travel, lodging, meals, exchange rate variance, etc.). These program fees should be assessed in the student information system whenever possible. The payment deadlines and refund schedules for these fees will vary from program to program. Payment due dates and refund dates can be earlier, but should not be later, than the due dates and refund dates for students taking campus-based courses
