WHAT MAKES A MENTORING RELATIONSHIP SUCCESSFUL?



- Collaborative approach to relationship
- Being open to new goals and ideas for the relationship
- Active listening
- Consistency and dependability
- Knowing that at times relationships can feel one-sided
- Two-party responsibility on how to spend time together
- Focusing on the person, not on the formal relationship
- Utilize program coordinator and institute resources

WHERE DO INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS FIT IN?



- International enrollment at American colleges and universities has grown exponentially
- U.S. has had a long tradition in reputable education, and our educational systems have grown in size and available opportunities
- The U.S. economy and job market attracts highly skilled (or soon to be highly skilled) people from all over the world
- Changes in the global education market have, some cases, made getting into U.S. universities comparatively easier than accessing those in student's own countries
- The majority of these students grow up with their own myths and beliefs about what university life will be like
 - Many are interested in the same things you are-building communities and support networks, sharing experiences, opportunities for life-long learning, networking, and fun. And of course, finding employment somewhere, and helping their own family prosper.

- 4. Introduce them to your personal and professional network, and find ways to learn about theirs
- 5. Explain how you navigate your own work-life balance, and what you would do if you could make it better
- 6. Share your attempts at being frugal. Where can students get the best value for their dollar?
