"The person you are now returning from abroad is not the same person who left in the first place...You have new habits, values, and ideas, sometimes without even realizing it!

[Others] may find it difficult to comprehend the changes you have been through....It can be difficult for them to understand your whole transformative experience, and you may find it hard to balance fulfilling old roles and breaking in new ones. This strain and stress can sometimes invoke a sense of helplessness or a loss of identity. This is what we call reverse culture shock, where you're learning who you are and how you fit into your culture after returning home from study abroad."



Who's eligible?


- ISA Alum (of any division)
- 2.75 cumulative GPA
- Passed all classes as a part of their ISA program





How it works

- ISA alum submit an application and go through an interview process
- Campus Study Abroad Office must approve
- Complete online training through Global Ambassador Schoology and required webinars







How it works

- Students complete 10 hours of unpaid work and are then compensated \$10/hour or their state minimum wage
- Hours worked for their study abroad office also count

- The Badge Program




